So here's the deal: there's been a revolt at Saint Louis University. Last fall the Faculty Council of the College of Arts and Sciences, the Faculty Senate, which represents the entire faculty, and the Student Government Association cast overwhelming votes of no confidence in the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the President. These actions followed a period of turmoil that perhaps began with the closing of the graduate school, which Kathleen opposed, three years ago, but were triggered by promulgation last fall of a new faculty

evaluation scheme that would have rendered faculty powerless. SLU Trustees have now forced the VPAA's resignation, begun negotiations with the Faculty Senate, and appeared to back away from unequivocal support for President Lawrence Biondi.
